

**FULLER CRAFT MUSEUM PRESENTS JOSH SIMPSON: A VISIONARY
JOURNEY IN GLASS**
MAY 1—NOVEMBER 28, 2010

Exhibition traces unique career of self-taught Massachusetts-based glass master

(Brockton, Mass. – March 24, 2010) Fuller Craft Museum presents *Josh Simpson: A Visionary Journey in Glass* from May 1—Nov. 28, 2010. This exhibition of approximately 100 works, selected from the artist's personal collection, traces the unique journey of this self-taught master of glass, from his early traditional pieces to the spectacular tour-de-force multi-layered works of the present.

Best known for his intricate glass “planets,” Josh Simpson creates worlds of wonder, inspired by nature and space exploration. The kaleidoscopic magic of his undersea, land, and outer-space vistas is also seen in many of his utilitarian objects – goblets, tumblers, vases-where he has pushed the limits of contemporary glass artistry. Simpson first experimented with glass when he was a student at Hamilton College in 1972. Since then, he has mastered all aspects of glassmaking from designing and building his own furnaces, to learning glass chemistry in order to create his own spectrum of colors. In addition to unique goblets, vases, and bowls, His luminous glass “planets,” complete with landscapes, underwater scenes, and vistas of outer space, reflect the earth and the vastness and complexity of the universe. Simpson’s wife, astronaut Catherine “Cady” Coleman, took one of his intricate glass planets into outer space with her on a space mission in 1995. Simpson lives and works in the Western Massachusetts town of Shelburne Falls.

According to Simpson, “Glass is an alchemic blend of sand and metallic oxides, combined with extraordinary, blinding heat. The result is a material that flows and drips like honey. When it’s hot, glass is alive! It moves gracefully and inexorably in response to gravity and centrifugal force. It possesses an inner light and transcendent radiant heat that make it simultaneously one of the most fascinating and one of the most frustrating materials to work. I attempt to coax it; all it wants to do is drip on the floor. Most of my work reflects a compromise between the glass and me -the piece is finished when we both agree.”

Simpson's art is included in the permanent collections of the White House Collection of American Crafts, Corning Museum of Glass in Cornwall, New York, Smithsonian American Art Museum, Museum of Decorative Arts in Prague, Czech Republic, Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, Yale University Art Gallery, and the Royal Ontario Museum. Josh Simpson will talk about the exhibition on May 2 at 12:30 p.m. at Fuller Craft. Tickets are \$7 for members and \$10 for non-members. The Museum will celebrate the opening of *Josh Simpson: A Visionary Journey in Glass* with a public reception on May 2 from 2—5 p.m. at the Museum. The reception is free for members and free with museum admission for all others.
